Message from HE Mark Regev, Ambassador of Israel to the Court of St James's

Conservative Party Conference falls on Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, and as we celebrate, I am delighted to report to you that the Israel-UK partnership is stronger than ever.

I am deeply proud that Israel was the first country to finalise a post-Brexit trade deal with the UK. With that accord now signed and sealed, together with three new agreements in taxation, research and innovation, I am confident our trade will continue to grow beyond the record f8.6bn we set in 2018. This means more jobs and prosperity for both our countries.

As Conservative Friends of Israel, you know better than most that we share a vital security relationship, which is actively saving lives. Earlier this year we welcomed Britain's Chief of Defence Staff to Israel, and the Royal Navy, Royal Air Force and British Army are working closer with the IDF than ever before. We hosted the first Israel-UK Veteran Games, where 150 British veterans and their families met their Israeli counterparts to compete and, alongside leading service charities and post-combat medical professionals, discuss ways our countries can better support those who have served.

Unfortunately, the security challenges we face have not disappeared. Iran threatens not just Western interests, but the West itself. The Islamic Republic is building long-range missiles capable of reaching Europe, and was recently exposed for orchestrating terror plots in Denmark, France, Germany, and even Britain. It is imperative we robustly confront the very real threat of a nuclear Iran, just as we must continue to stand against the Islamic Republic's belligerency and aggression. That is why the UK's decision earlier this year to fully proscribe Tehran's terrorist proxy Hezbollah was both necessary and right.

Britain has a new team at the top. In Prime Minister Johnson, Israel is fortunate to have a friend who as both Mayor of London and Foreign Secretary championed the important partnership between our two democracies. He is undoubtedly a friend of the Jewish people and the Jewish state, and under his leadership, I am confident that Israel-UK relations will continue to go from strength-to-strength.

Of course, the bond between Israel and Britain would not be what it is today without CFI, and I am grateful to Lord Polak, Lord Pickles, and Stephen Crabb MP, who with James Gurd and all the team have brought our countries even closer. Thank you, and I wish you and your families a Shanah Torah.

Dear Friends

Israel was my first posting as a diplomat and I am thrilled to be back, and see how much has changed. My first three months have been busy and fascinating.

Since arriving. I have been travelling around Israel, from the Lebanon and Syrian borders and Golan Heights, Haifa to Be'er Sheva, from the Weizmann Science Institute to the British-Israeli Community, to get to know Israel again, see first-hand what has changed and how things have developed. Israel is different in many ways from a decade and a half ago.

Our bilateral trade is better than ever - over \$10bln a year and growing fast. There is growing appetite in both the British business sector and the Israeli to reach out and collaborate. I have witnessed first-hand how strong and prosperous UK-Israel relations have become.

I have seen the sparks of British-Israeli research collaborations in my visits to Israel's universities, including our successful BIRAX joint research programme. We have British giants such as, IAG and the NHS seeking techcollaborations in Israel through our UK-Israel Tech Hub, and some digital health and mobility partnerships between British corporates and Israeli start-ups are now taking shape.

I visited Energean's gas rig near Haifa, a massive UK-Israel collaboration that gives Israel energy security, reduces pollution and boosts the local economy, and met with companies ready to take their business to the UK in order to reach the global market.

I have visited Israel's borders as well, to get a grasp of its complexity and see how we can further collaborate to make sure Israel is safe within its borders. Our countries keep working closely together on security and defence, tackling regional challenges that we both face. We just had a RAF Typhoon aircraft landing in Ramat David base the first British fighter plane since independence. We have also joined hands over cyber, bringing together the efforts of two international leaders in this field

The Embassy and I value our collaboration, and I enjoyed hosting a CFI delegation at the Residence – the first of many, I hope. I am aware of the work CFI has been doing over the years; I look forward to future activities with CFI and other parliamentarians and see how the bilateral relationship continues to benefit from those connections.

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BORIS, ISRAEL AND THE JEWISH COMMUNITY

In July 2019, CFI were delighted to welcome self-declared "passionate Zionist" and long-standing friend of Israel, Boris Johnson, as the UK's new Prime Minister. It marks an exciting new chapter in the UK-Israel relationship, and CFI looks forward to working with Prime Minister Johnson and his Government to continue strengthening the deep UK-Israel partnership.

FRIEND OF ISRAEL AND JEWISH COMMUNITY

Boris Johnson has a long history of standing shoulder to shoulder with Israel and the Jewish community. He volunteered at a kibbutz as a student in the 1980s, and visited Israel with CFI in 2004.

As Mayor of London in 2015, Boris Johnson led the first ever London-Israel trade mission. He said: "I'm proud that the UK is now Israel's biggest trading partner in Europe and we saw huge investments both ways, partly actually as a result of that trip".

As Foreign Secretary, Boris Johnson delivered the official invitation to HRH The Duke of Cambridge to visit Israel, the landmark first ever official visit by a member of the Royal Family. Mr Johnson said in June 2019: "It was a true pleasure for me to be able to organise the official visit, one which I believe without my office would have been different or potentially not undertaken at all". Boris Johnson played an instrumental role as Foreign Secretary in marking the centenary of the Balfour Declaration in November 2017. At an event to mark the occasion, he hailed the "miracle of Israel" and stated that the creation of the country is "one of the greatest political triumphs of the 20th Century". He emphasised in a parliamentary statement on the centenary: "We should celebrate the existence of the State of Israel".

Boris Johnson told supporters at CFI's Conservative Party Conference Reception in 2016 while he was Foreign Secretary, that "Britain and Israel are both countries where our dreams are still bigger than their achievements" and declared that "our best days are ahead". He added: "We must stand and work together; Britain, Israel and Conservative Friends of Israel can build thosedreams together".

SUPPORTING ISRAEL'S RIGHT TO SELF-DEFENCE

Boris Johnson has been a staunch supporter of Israel's right to defend itself throughout his political life. He underlined in a June 2019 letter to CFI supporters: "I firmly believe, like every nation, that Israel has the fundamental right to self-defence, and I am greatly disheartened and upset over the constant illegal and deadly rocket attacks which are launched daily by Hamas terrorists".

As Foreign Secretary in October 2017, Boris Johnson emphasised that the Hamas terror group must "renounce terror", recognise Israel's right to exist and "cease and desist from violent antisemitic propaganda". AND SANCTIONS

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Mr Johnson wrote in a letter to CFI supporters in June 2019: "As Mayor of London I refused to bend to calls for boycotts on Israeli goods and I want to assure you that I will continue to refuse to bend to the whims of racists or antisemites. We must trade more with Israel and, under my administration, we will!"

OPPOSITION TO BOYCOTT, DIVESTMENT AND SANCTIONS



Mr Johnson pledged in June 2019 to be a "champion for Jews in Britain and around the world".

Prime Minister Johnson welcomed Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to 10 Downing Street in September 2019, in one of his first visits by a foreign head of Government. The two leaders reaffirmed the deep friendship between the UK and Israel.

COMBATING ANTISEMITISM

Prime Minister Johnson has reaffirmed his support for the UK Holocaust Memorial and Learning Centre next to Parliament, stating that he regards the construction as "a shared national responsibility".

He has promised to safeguard the Government's pledge of £140,000 to combat antisemitism on university campuses, which will enable students and university leaders from across the UK to visit Auschwitz-Birkenau. In September 2019, Boris Johnson's Government announced £100,000 funding to tackle the spread of antisemitism on social media.

IN CONVERSATION WITH THE UK'S AMBASSADOR TO ISRAEL, H.E. NEIL WIGAN OBE

E. Neil Wigan OBE became the UK's Ambassador to Israel in June 2019, after previously serving as the Director for Africa at the Foreign & Commonwealth Office (FCO).

CFI Informed Editor, Sedef Akademir, sat down with Ambassador Wigan to hear about his experience in Israel so far, and his views on the UK-Israel relationship.

How are you finding your time in Israel and your role so far?

Israel was my first posting as a diplomat 15 years ago, and I am thrilled to be back. A lot has changed and got much bigger - from the tech industry, to the culinary scene, to the Pride Parade. In the past three months I have been travelling around Israel, from the Gaza periphery to the Lebanon border, reaching out to different communities, getting a taste of the tech scene, and visiting universities and research centres. All areas we are already working together on and can do even more together on.

How will you promote the UK-Israel relationship?

We have record levels of bilateral cooperation in trade, investment, science and technology - and we want to reach even higher. Israelis know how much the UK values our partnership and is eager to work together. We have the best universities in the world and we want to collaborate with Israel on research. Israeli and British high-tech are natural partners. We welcome Israeli businesses and want to help them invest in the UK or to cooperate with a British company. This is the message I wish to get across the UK is a prime partner for Israel and is eager to collaborate and deepen our links, highlight both our countries' strengths.
I want the Embassy Tech Hub, Science officers and Trade Team working closely together to maximise the opportunities.

What in your eyes are Israel's greatest strengths?

I think one of Israel's greatest strengths is its variety – nowhere on earth has so much politics, history, culture and religion in such a small space. And ingenuity, which leads to great innovation and entrepreneurship. Israelis are developing technologies at an impressive rate that the UK can benefit from.

In what areas would you like to see more cooperation between Israel and the UK?

I'd like to dive further into collaborating with specific sectors in Israel. We are already powering the Arabtech Port aimed for entrepreneurs in the Israeli Arab community. We are working with Bizmax, an accelerator for Haredi entrepreneurs. I met seven of them headed to London to present their start-ups to the UK tech scene. Security cooperation is developing rapidly – I watched an RAF fighter jet land at an Israel Air Force base for the first time since Israel's independence.

How do you think Britons view Israel's relationship with the UK?

I think British people increasingly see Israel in terms of technology, innovation and culture - from food to LGBT rights. And perhaps less in terms of politics and media images of conflict. Over 250,000 British visitors come to Israel every year, so more people see Israel for themselves.



How do Israelis view the UK?

Even more positively than I remember. Israelis love visiting the UK, whether for higher education, business or tourism. I've already swapped tips on walking the West Highland Way, discovered that an Israeli company owns the biggest phosphate mine in Britain, and heard University Presidents say they want the same cooperation with UK counterparts as they do in the U.S. British brands from Superdry to Jo Malone are popular. I judged some amazing Harry Potter costumes, and Israelis still rave to me about Prince William's visit last year.

What do you think the future holds for UK-Israel relations post-Brexit?

The UK and Israel have already signed a trade continuity agreement which simplifies trade and allows businesses to trade as freely as they do now after Brexit, so everything is set in place for a smooth transition. Israel was one of the first countries to agree a deal, showing the appetite on both sides. Since the referendum, bilateral trade has increased rapidly to over \$10 billion, and more Israeli companies are investing in the UK, or listing in London. Prime Minister Netanyahu told me he wants an even closer relationship after Brexit.

What do you think are the biggest similarities and differences between the UK and Israel?

Israelis like to 'move fast and break things' – particularly in technology and business (and sometimes when driving). British institutions can feel a lot more deliberate. Israelis are still as famously to the point and direct as ever - British understatement does not work. The key similarities are shared democratic values, and an excitement about the power of technology to change lives.

CELEBRATING THE UK-ISRAEL TRADE PARTNERSHIP

On all counts, business between the UK and Israel is booming and there is much to celebrate.

f the many opportunities that Brexit will afford the United Kingdom. perhaps the most exciting is our ability to forge new free trade deals with some of the world's most future-looking economies. It is for this very reason that I was so delighted that earlier in 2019, Israel was one of the first countries to agree a free trade agreement in principle with the UK, ensuring seamless continuity in existing trade and allowing businesses to avoid any additional tariffs or barriers. It is a clear testament to the strength of our relationship.

Women

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Our bilateral trade is now at a record high of \$10 billion a year. and we have unprecedented levels of cooperation in investment, science and technology. This has the potential to reach even greater heights following Brexit.

Despite the doom and gloom pedalled by some, in the year after Britain voted to leave the EU, Israeli investment into the UK increased. 32 Israeli companies entered the British market, investing £152 million into our economy and creating 888 new jobs - a rise of 33% on the previous year. With such strong continued growth it's perhaps little surprise that Britain is now Israel's largest trading partner in Europe.

At the start of 2019, I had the pleasure of attending the Jewish Women's Business Network's conference at the London Stock Exchange (LSE). where we celebrated the contribution of Jewish women to the global economy. I spoke to many Israeli

entrepreneurs who were invigorated by the opportunities of increased collaboration between our two countries, and shared my optimism.

Israel and the UK are natural trading partners. Brexit provides a distinctly unique chance for even greater cooperation between our two countries, and there is exceptional scope for growth in bilateral trade and investment. There is huge potential in areas such as science and technology where we are both world leaders. Indeed, I've heard all about some of the exciting new tech companies coming out of Israel that my Conservative colleagues met with on last year's CFI trade delegation to Israel.

Our two nations can continue to learn a lot from each other. I've said it before and I'll say it again; Britain's younger generation are Uber-riding, Airbnb-ing, Deliveroo-eating freedom fighters, and I'm all for that. Much of this pioneering spirit is seen in Israel, a small outward-looking country where innovation and liberty is championed, recognised around the world as the 'Start-Up Nation'.

I have long admired Israel's high-tech solutions to some of the world's most pressing problems, and science and innovation are at the heart of our Government's strategy for promoting prosperity and growth. Both of our nations understand the importance of building an innovation-driven economy. Last year, in order to boost academic and scientific collaboration between the UK

and Israel, we signed a multimillion pound deal with the Israeli Innovation Authority to support cutting edge ideas in fields including artificial intelligence, as well as a new £5 million fund, BIRAX Ageing, for collaboration with the ageing process and its effect on human health.

The UK Israel Tech Hub, which was set up in 2011 by the British Embassy in Israel and was the first of its kind in the world, promotes partnerships in technology between the UK and Israel. Last year, the hub celebrated the facilitation of some 175 tech partnerships. The partnership has been so successful that it has helped to boost the UK economy by up to £800 million since launching, and the model is now being replicated for five new international hubs.

There is still much more to do and we should never dim our ambitions. I look forward to visiting Israel in the near future to see the 'Start-Up Nation' for myself and explore more opportunities to ensure that our partnership continues to flourish.

n February 2019, after years of campaigning by parliamentarians, I was delighted that a Conservative government proscribed the terror group Hezbollah in its entirety in the UK, a bold decision taken by our Home Secretary at the time, Rt. Hon. Sajid Javid MP.

In taking this decision, Sajid and our Conservative Government reaffirmed its zero tolerance stance against terrorism, and showed that it listened to the wishes of the British public. A 2018 ComRes poll found that Britons were four times more likely to support a full ban on Hezbollah than to oppose it.

It was unfortunately, however, the first time ever that the main opposition party refused to support the banning of a terrorist organisation.

Since that decision, we have seen immediate results. While demonstrators still freely took part in the annual AI Quds Day anti-Israel hate rally in London, the usual display of yellow AK-47 emblazoned flags was not seen.

Previously, only Hezbollah's so-called 'military wing' was banned in the UK, allowing protesters to wave the Hezbollah flag as long as the flags featured a small 'disclaimer' that they were only supporting Hezbollah's 'political wing'. Thanks to our Government, and vigorous campaigning by parliamentarians and members of the public, it is now a criminal offence to display support for Hezbollah. Hezbollah, which is backed by Iran, is continuing in its attempts to destabilise the fragile situation in the Middle East, and repeatedly threatens to wipe Israel off the map. But its terrorism is not merely confined to the region; the group has staged several fatal and calamitous attacks around the world and has a global network of nefarious criminal activity.

It was even planning to wreak devastation in London. The Telegraph revealed in June 2019 that Iran and Hezbollah-linked alleged terrorists were caught stockpiling tonnes of explosive materials in North West London at a secret bomb factory in 2015. The plot was uncovered by MI5 and the Metropolitan Police just months after the UK signed the Iran nuclear deal alongside P5+1 world powers.

An astonishing three metric tonnes of ammonium nitrate was discovered at the London properties – more than was used in the Oklahoma City bombing that killed 168 people. The scale of carnage that could have been wrought in our capital is unimaginable.

It was later reported that Israeli intelligence was responsible for providing British authorities with information that helped foil the London plot, underlining how vital our cooperation in counterterrorism is in keeping our countries, and the world, safe.

There have been a number of similar Hezbollah and Iran-linked terror incidents and plots across Europe in recent years, including in Cyprus, the Netherlands and

France. In Bulgaria in 2012, five Israeli tourists and a Bulgarian driver were killed when a Hezbollah bomb went off on a bus in the city of Burgas's airport.

The proscription of Hezbollah ended a long-standing absurd distinction between so-called 'political' and 'military' wings, when in reality they are inseparable.

Surprisingly, Hamas, which runs Gaza and threatens the existence of Israel on a daily basis has still yet to be fully proscribed as a terror organisation in our country, with its 'political wing' and 'military wing' similarly separated. Its charter, which calls for Israel's destruction, is used by the whole organisation. Now is the time to revisit this.

Baroness McGregor-Smith CBE Chair of the Office for Tackling Injustices

n the summer of 2019 I had the great pleasure of visiting Israel and the West Bank for the first time with a delegation of Conservative parliamentarians and candidates, which was coordinated by CFI.

It was my first time in the country and I was overwhelmed by the vibrancy of the place, the warmth of the people and the mix of cultures.

We saw for ourselves how different the reality is to the newspaper headlines. It was a real eye-opener to speak to people from all sections of Israeli society – from academics, journalists and politicians, to ordinary citizens. Hearing their perspective on the issues on the ground made us think deeply about the realities of living there and the challenges facing the region.

At the same time, I got a real sense of enthusiasm from the people that I met and their optimism for their country. After all, this is a nation that from its inception defied geographical odds and prospered to become a beacon in the region.

One of the highlights of our visit was an unexpected meeting with the legendary illusionist Uri Geller, who gifted us a spoon he had bent and signed for Prime Minister Boris Johnson!

It was at a visit to Israel's ambulance service Magen David Adom that we got a chance to see the country's use of cutting edge technology in order to save lives by shortening response times to medical emergencies. It would be fantastic to bring some of this innovation in emergency care to the NHS.

I delegation visits Magen David Adom I loved visiting Save A Child's Heart in Holon, just outside of Tel Aviv, and seeing the amazing work that Israeli surgeons do in saving the lives of children from all corners of the world. The children, who come from some of the world's most deprived communities, receive free life-saving heart surgery in Israel. I found out that half of the 5,000 children that have been treated so far were from the West Bank and Gaza, and that the medical professionals share their expertise with doctors visiting from the Palestinian Territories and elsewhere around the world.

We also travelled to Ramallah in the West Bank, where we met with Palestine Liberation Organisation (PLO) Chief Negotiator Saeb Erekat for a wide-ranging discussion on local and regional issues affecting the Palestinian population. Separately, it was fascinating to hear from Palestinian polling expert Dr Khalil Shikaki who informed us about the latest public opinion trends







among Palestinians. It's clear that progress towards a lasting peace is needed more than ever, with younger generations seemingly becoming more cynical about a workable solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

I will never forget my visit to Yad Vashem. As a member of the Prime Minister's Holocaust Commission, it was a deep honour to visit and to lay a wreath in the Hall of Remembrance on behalf of the group, commemorating the victims of the Holocaust. It was an incredibly moving experience. I understand all the more the importance of the founding of the Israeli state in providing a refuge for thousands of Holocaust victims and as a Jewish homeland.

In every way, the visit was illuminating and I would like to thank CFI for the opportunity. I would certainly recommend others to go and see this extraordinary country for themselves.

rom the moment I arrived in Israel with a group of fellow Conservative Parliamentary Candidates in July 2019, I was blown away by the innovation, determination and strength of this tiny country.

The CFI itinerary was packed with dynamic speakers; journalists, politicians and academics from all sides and none.

Yet for me, the legendary Israeli 'chutzpah' was displayed most brightly in the women we met.

It's no wonder I nicknamed her Supergran!

Returning to Tel Aviv. we visited the children's home at Save A Child's Heart, an Israeli charity providing life-saving heart surgery to children from the developing world, the West Bank and Gaza. The children's home is run by an incredible Northern Irish-born woman.



who told the group that no child would be turned away. I am now dedicated to ensuring that religion. borders and conflict will not get in her way.

The trip went on like this. Tech leaders, scientists, politicians, diplomats, factory workers, teachers, mothers - these women made me want to stand up straighter. Their energy and determination was truly inspirational.

Our trip to Yad Vashem in particular will stay with me forever.

The building is of course impressive on its own, but our knowledgeable (female!) guide amplified the carefully curated information about individuals and families that perished in the Holocaust. Their stories are a constant reminder that such appalling crimes must never happen again.

I was overwhelmed to lay a wreath on behalf of the group to commemorate the victims of the Holocaust, an honour that will drive me to ensure

that Holocaust remembrance remains a key part of the Conservative Party's legacy to this country.

At the end of the delegation, the group took it in turns to reflect on the unforgettable week. After talking about our time in Yad Vashem, it did not take me long to decide what else to say.

THE THREAT FROM IRAN

Tom Tugendhat MBE MP Chairman of the Foreign **Affairs Select Committee**

y the time you read this, Iran may have finally released the Stena Impero, the British-flagged oil tanker it seized in the Strait of Hormuz in July 2019. But, even if this incident has been resolved, it shows that nothing much has changed.

Since the revolution of 1979, hostage-taking has been a key element of Iranian foreign policy. Our response to the latest imprisonment, along with the recent arrest of a retired businessman, a British Council employee and, of course, Nazanin Zaghari-Ratcliffe on trumped-up spying charges, shows that successive British governments have had no answer to a cruel policy of using dual nationals as leverage. We simply have not learned how to respond to Tehran.

We could learn much from Israel, which labours under no such illusions. One of the Iranian Revolutionary Guard's (IRGC) explicit goals is the destruction of Israel. The westward expansion of its influence following, first, the 2003 invasion of Iraq, and, second, the outbreak of civil war in Syria in 2011, means that the threat posed by the IRGC has never been greater.

The IRGC's support for Assad's regime in Syria makes it completely clear that it will stop at nothing – even the mass murder of fellow Muslims - to advance its fundamental aim. In attacking

IRGC bases in Syria and Irag - recently thwarting an imminent drone attack from a base outside Damascus - Israel has acted in self-defence. As the pressure created by American sanctions increases, Iran's willingness to hit out at U.S. allies, in the hope of causing Western disunity, may grow.

Iran has a forty-year-long history of financing and supporting terrorism overseas. Israeli citizens and diplomats have most often been its targets, but they are not alone. The recent revelation that in 2015 our own security services broke up a plot by Hezbollah to stockpile bomb-making chemicals in London gives us a flavour of Iranian ambitions.

It was good to see Sajid Javid, when Home Secretary in February 2019, abandon the artificial distinction we made between the political and military wings of Iran's proxy militia in Lebanon, and proscribe Hezbollah in its entirety. But the British Government lacks a more comprehensive policy to contain Iran's ambitions.

That is why the Foreign Affairs Committee has launched an enquiry into the UK and Iran's regional role. As well as investigating our relationship with the country. we shall be asking ministers and officials searching questions about the policies they have to stop Iran destabilising the region and how the Foreign Office will approach a renewed multilateral effort to curb Iran's nuclear ambitions.

Perhaps most importantly, we need to stand up for human rights in the country which is crying out for freedom. The UK needs to be, once again, a friend of the Iranian people, and that means standing up to the regime.

haun Bailey AM is the Conservative candidate taking on Sadig Khan in 2020's London Mayoral Election. Shaun. a former adviser to David Cameron and a current London Assembly Member, has been a long-time friend of Israel.

CFI sat down with Shaun to hear about his plans as Mayor for London and support for Israel and the Jewish community.

Where does your support for Israel come from?

I've been a staunch friend of Israel for as long as I can remember. To me, Israel is a beacon of light. How can you not admire a country that prides itself in innovation, entrepreneurialism, democracy and pluralism? And our nations' friendship is built on those shared values.

What is your fondest memory of visiting Israel with CFI?

I had the great pleasure of visiting Israel for the first time with CFI a few years ago. It was a real

Visiting Auschwitz-Birkenau on March of the Living, marching alongside more than 10,000 participants from all corners of the world in memory of all Holocaust victims brought to life the real barbarity of this tragedy in a way that no textbook ever could. It was incredibly moving to march together with Holocaust survivors, and reminded me that we cannot remain silent about horrors being committed anywhere around the world.

As Mayor of London, how will you stamp out antisemitism?

That British Jews should be experiencing antisemitism is abhorrent. Antisemitism has no place in our society, and needs to be called out for what it is - racism in its basest form. I vow to stand shoulder to shoulder with the Jewish community in our shared fight against this most pernicious of evils. To defeat evil. I believe it is vital that we remember the past and the roots of this disease. That's why I stand squarely in support of a National Holocaust Memorial and Learning Centre in our capital city, which has been so passionately supported by three Conservative Prime Ministers. I am very pleased that the revised planning application addresses the worries over the environmental impact on Victoria Park Gardens. I believe that the Memorial will enhance this important public place next to our Houses of Parliament.

IT'S TIME TO RECOGNISE THE PLIGHT OF JEWISH EES FROM THE EAS

Tents used as temporary housing for Jewish immigrants in Israel

efore Muammar Gaddafi came to power in Libya in the 1960s, my late grandfather, Renato Halfon, was a member of a small, but thriving, community of Italian Tripolitanian Jews.

Like so many other Jews in North African and Middle Eastern countries, he was forced to flee the country in 1968, as hostility against the Jewish population reached intolerable levels. His lifetime's work - a clothing business - was seized under the new regime, most likely given to Gaddafi's supporters to buy their loyalty, as was the case with many Jewish and Italian businesses.

With pogroms becoming a regular occurrence in Libya, Renato saw the writing on the wall and sent my father, Clement, to England in the late 1950s, at the young age of 15. After initially seeking refuge in Italy, my grandfather joined him in North London soon after.

Jewish people had lived in Libva for over 2,300 years and, by 1948, the population numbered more than 38,000. By the end of 1970, nearly all Jews and Italians had left Libya.

In June 2019, I shared my grandfather's story in the first ever UK parliamentary debate on the subject of Jewish refugees from the Middle East and North Africa. As I said in the unprecedented debate, the flight of historic Jewish communities has altered the shape and face of the region forever, but it is rarely recognised or spoken about on the international stage.

Between 1948 and 1972, pogroms took place in every Arab country against the Jewish people living there, with countless age-old communities now extinct.

Many Jews fled their homes across the region after the United Nations' (UN) decision to partition Palestine into Jewish and Arab states in 1947, as opposition to a modern Jewish state invariably morphed into discrimination against the local Jewish population.

Yet while Jewish refugees have successfully integrated into Israel and countries around the world, the Palestinian refugee population has been abandoned. Tellingly, the

Arab League even resolved in 1959 not to allow Palestinians to become citizens of Arab countries. It is clear that this decision to perpetuate their suffering is rooted in a troubling desire to prolong the conflict with Israel.

A lasting Middle East peace will only endure if rights and redress are provided to Jewish refugees as well as Palestinians. The UN has passed 172 resolutions specifically on Palestinian refugees, but there have been none relating to Jewish refugees.

It's time to recognise the plight of Jewish refugees from the Middle East and give their story equal prominence at long last.

WE MUST BUILD A **HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL AND LEARNING CENTRE** THAT WILL BE A **BEACON TO** THE WORLD

n a world of Holocaust denial. historical revisionism and the rise of antisemitism, it is more important than ever to ensure that the new UK Holocaust Memorial and Learning Centre tells a story that resonates with ordinary people and raises questions about Britain's role. For visitors to think about what they would have done should things have turned out differently and if the Nazis had occupied the British mainland.

I can't overemphasise the importance of placing this memorial next to the Houses of Parliament. It is within a few hundred yards of where all the key decisions and debates on British reaction to the Holocaust took place.

The Memorial will honour the six million Jewish men. women and children who were murdered in the Holocaust. The learning centre will also remember the other victims of Nazi persecution, including Roma, gay and disabled people - and the victims of subsequent genocides.

Victoria Tower Gardens was chosen as its historical, emotional and political significance substantially outweighed all other locations. and offered the greatest potential impact and visibility for the project.

The location was announced nearly four years ago by the Prime Minister. An international design competition was announced with the shortlisted entrants displayed in an exhibition which toured the whole of the UK. The eventual winning entrant was unanimously adopted by an independent judging panel.

Victoria Tower Gardens, a sadlv neglected piece of land, will be enhanced by the Memorial. The quality of the drainage and the grass will be improved. Paths will be laid that allows water to reach the roots of trees and vegetation, rather than lie dormant in ugly puddles. A new riverside promenade with disabled access, and a children's playground with adjoining café will add to the gardens.

There can be no more powerful symbol of our commitment to remembering the Holocaust than placing the Memorial next to Parliament.

At a time when parts of Europe are seeking to rewrite history, it is important for us in the UK to set a clear example that we will look at our history with an unblinking eye.

Standing beside Parliament, the memorial will remind people, as they leave and look toward Victoria Tower, that Parliament is a bastion against tyranny.

As those who sit in both Houses look out at the Memorial, it will remind them that the legislature has the power to protect or to oppress.

heresa May will be remembered as one of Britain's most steadfast friends of Israel and a champion of the Jewish community. Throughout her time as Prime Minister, Mrs May's leadership in strengthening the UK-Israel relationship and fighting antisemitism was unwavering.

On CFI

Since first being elected to Parliament, Theresa May engaged extensively with CFI, speaking at the organisation's Parliamentary Reception as Home Secretary, and at CFI's Annual Business Lunch in 2016 and 2018.

In a letter to CFI supporters in Informed Magazine 2018. Theresa May said: "I am proud of the close relationship between our two countries - and I am grateful for everything that Conservative Friends of Israel are doing to promote that friendship".

Recognising the support the Conservative Party received from the Jewish community and CFI volunteers in the 2017 General Election, the Prime Minister expressed: "I was proud at the general election... so many Jewish people gave our Party their support - not least thanks to the hard work of CFI volunteers in constituencies up and down the country".

Record Levels of Bilateral Trade

Under her leadership, the UK-Israel relationship went from strength to strength with record bilateral trade levels amounting to \$10 billion in 2018. At the start of 2019. Israel was one of the first countries to agree a post-Brexit free trade agreement in principle with the UK. Israeli investment in the UK has increased substantially in recent vears, and the UK is now Israel's largest trading partner in Europe.

Celebrating the UK-Israel Friendship

Theresa May's leadership oversaw HRH The Duke of Cambridge, Prince William's landmark visit to Israel

- the first ever official visit to the Jewish State by a member of the Roval Family. The much-anticipated visit further reaffirmed the strength and warmth of the UK-Israel relationship.

In 2017, Theresa May hosted Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu in London to mark the centenary of the Balfour Declaration, and celebrated Israel's achievements since its founding. She said in September 2018: "I will never forget standing with Prime Minister Netanvahu to view the original version of that letter. It was a very special moment and it encapsulates for me how I feel about Israel. For I am not just proud to support Israel; I am proud of our role in the creation of Israel".

Fighting Antisemitism

Theresa May has fiercely fought antisemitism throughout her political career and it is thanks to her that the community has received record levels of financial support to ensure its security at this difficult time. Government funding to the Community Security Trust (CST) for protective measures for the Jewish community increased to £14 million in 2019.

In December 2016, Prime Minister May announced at CFI's Annual Business Lunch that the UK Government would be adopting the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA) definition of antisemitism. She has been a strident supporter of a National Holocaust Memorial and Learning Centre next to Parliament, and forthright in her condemnation of antisemitism in British politics.

In a letter to the Board of Deputies of British Jews in June 2019, she underlined: "My support for the community will continue in the vears to come".

Strong Opposition to BDS

Theresa May was staunchly opposed to the Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) campaign against Israel and the singling out of the Jewish State. She underlined at CFI's

Annual Business Lunch in December 2018: "We will stand by Israel when it is treated unfairly at the United Nations and have no truck with bovcotts, divestment or sanctions that are simply unacceptable"

Hezbollah Ban

Under Theresa May's watch, Hezbollah was proscribed as a terror organisation in its entirety in February 2019. The UK previously only proscribed Hezbollah's 'military wing', separating this from its so-called 'political wing'. The decision came after cross-party parliamentarians regularly called for the group to be banned, in particular raising their concerns about the waving of Hezbollah flags on the streets of London at the annual Al Quds Day rally.

Supporting Israel's Right to Self-Defence

The Government under Theresa May's premiership was resolute in its support of Israel's right to defend itself in the face of attacks from terrorist groups.

As Prime Minister, Theresa May said in September 2018: "Israel has thrived in the face of the constant threat of violence from its neighbours, the menace of terrorist attacks against its citizens, and the opposition of those who deny even its right to exist. As Prime Minister, I will always support Israel's right to defend itself".

ISRAEL'S GREEN REVOLUTION

Since its establishment, Israel has developed innovative and efficient solutions in harsh environmental conditions. Although Israel is a small nation comprising of over 50% desert and only 20% naturally arable land, it has emerged as a world leader in agricultural technology (agritech).

Today, Israel manages to produce 95% of its own food requirements. There are currently over 400 Israeli agritech companies working on innovations including drought and water efficiency, crop productivity and waste management. One Israeli company, Tevel, is even building a fleet of fruit-picking drones for harvesting, drawing global attention.

Israel is the world leader in water recycling, recycling around **90%** of its domestic wastewater. Israel vastly outranks even the second most efficient recycled water user, Spain, which only recycles 17% of its wastewater for agriculture.

The nation exports its **drip irrigation technology** throughout the world, including to many developing countries.

Airbus plan to cooperate with small Israeli companies to implement technologies that aid farmers in crop productivity by seeing which areas of the crops are suffering using satellite imagery. This is known as **'smart farming'**, an area that Israeli agritech companies are leading research on.

Israel is also pioneering the development of digital farming systems which have allowed farmers to control their yields through technologically controlling water, pesticides and fertiliser usage.

Israelis have made numerous food-related advances including the invention of modern varieties of the cherry tomato, and the country is quickly becoming a powerhouse for food-tech start-up companies.

Known as a 'superpower of sustainability', Israel **recycles** 77% of bottles and cans, and over 85% of Israeli households use **solar energy**.

Technological achievements include computer-controlled drip irrigation, computerised early-warning systems for leaks, and thermal imaging for crops and vegetables.

Israeli start-ups are also leading within the field of **sustainable meat**, with companies such as SuperMeat, which is developing technology to organically grow chicken meat from animal cells, and Future Meat Technologies, which manufactures lab-grown fat and muscle cells.

Jet Eat, also based in Israel, is working on plant-based food products grown in labs which replicate meat using natural ingredients.

Israeli agricultural innovation continues to drive what has been described as a **Fourth Industrial Revolution**, with new technologies becoming an integral part of this ever-growing industry.

- CFI thanks then-Prime Minister Theresa May for her "invaluable" support of Israel and the UK-Israel relationship, following her announcement that she would resign as Conservative Party leader on 7th June.

MAY

2019

DECEMBER 2018

A TASTE OF ISRAEL IN LONDON

Over the past few years Israeli cuisine has transformed our capital city's culinary map, meaning you don't need to fly all the way to the Middle East in order to taste some of the country's delights. Here are some of our favourite spots in London to get authentic Israeli food.



NOPI

Founded by one of Britain's most loved chefs, Yotam Ottolenghi, the Soho-based restaurant has the chef's trademarks, with platters full of salads greeting guests as they arrive, and a menu which celebrates bold flavours. Vegetarians have plenty of choice, with a wide selection of tasting plates. Signature dishes include courgette and manouri cheese fritters with rose harissa voghurt, and coriander seed-crusted burrata with slices of blood orange.



The Palomar

London's most well-known Israeli restaurant, The Palomar, combines modern dishes from Jerusalem with a mix of international influences, served in a stylish and energetic surrounding. The menu here is made up of shared plates, from beetroot carpaccio to harissa chicken. Don't miss out on the homemade labneh, and end with a dessert of traditional rosewater infused milk pudding – malabi.





Hummus Bar

For hummus heaven. look no further than Hummus Bar in Golders Green and Hendon. It's kosher, with flavours that pack a punch. Order large plates of smooth, creamy Israeli hummus served with various toppings like salt beef and caramelised onions or falafel and tahini, each served with fresh hot flatbreads. It's unbeatable. The brisket balls and crispy Moroccan lamb cigars are also a must have.



Coal Office

A creative collaboration between British designer Tom Dixon and renowned Israeli chef Assaf Granit. The Granary Square restaurant's immersive dining experience is an exploration of both dishes and design, with a carefully curated menu exploring the flavours, spices, and textures of the Mediterranean. Highlights include kubaneh — a Yemeni bronzed buttery brioche knot, Machneyuda's polenta, and shish barak — East Jerusalem dumplings with pine nuts and yoghurt.





Berber & Q

A meat lover's paradise under an East London railway arch, that takes inspiration from the streets and cafe culture of Tel Aviv. The meat is grilled over an open charcoal-fired mangal, and the restaurant has an array of mezze and plenty of Middle Eastern themed cocktails. Berber & Q's 'Full Israeli' breakfast platter is also hard to beat.



The Good Egg

The Good Egg is a mecca for brunch lovers, where a colourful Middle Eastern/Eastern European fusion of flavours is served at their two deli-style restaurants. While the original site is located in Stoke Newington, their newest branch is nestled in Soho's buzzy Kingly Court, with a bakery counter stacked with hand-rolled bagels and babka. You can't go wrong with their delicious shakshuka!



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
